Fraud Alert—Don't get Ripped off! Report Check Scams

The Bamberg Branch Office (CID) reminds Bamberg Soldiers, spouses and civilians to remain aware of current e-mail and check scams. Local criminal reports have uncovered a variation in the current Nigerian Check Scam.



If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Take the time to familiarize yourself with current internet, e-mail and fraudulent check scams. Don't get ripped off! How can I tell if it's a Scam?

There are three commonalities to the check scam:

1. E-mail contact between Seller and Buyer
2. Payment made to you by check drawn on a foreign bank
3. The check is for **more** than the price you are selling your items for.

How the scam works:

1. Seller (victim) advertises a motorcycle, television or other "high ticket" item for sale either online or in the Stars & Stripes. Ad includes an email address.
2. Buyer (scammer), in another country, responds to ad via e-mail (or other non-traceable means)
3. Buyer offers a good price and agrees to send a paper check. Check arrives and is written for thousands of dollars more than the agreed price. Explanations for excess varies with each case and should be ignored.

If you receive a check in excess for an item you are selling either online or through the newspaper, contact the Bamberg Legal Assistance Office at 0951-300-7609 or SA Thomas E. McDevitt at Bamberg CID at 469-8056

4. Seller deposits the check in his/her bank account.
5. Seller returns the Buyer the excess, usually thousands of dollars.
6. Seller is notified that the Buyer's check bounced. Usually the check is a forgery.
7. Seller's bank recalls its provisional credit and the Seller loses thousands of dollars.
The Seller can lose **money and their item for sale** if they ship it to the Buyer before the check bounces. The Buyer rarely picks up the item for sale because that act could be traced.

POV License Plates Must be Properly Displayed

Effective now through January 10, 2007, USAG Bamberg Military Police will begin issuing warnings to all drivers of POVs not displaying license plates in accordance with AE Reg 190-1, after Jan. 10 citations will be issued.

AE Reg 190-1, DATED 4 Dec 06 States:

3-18. DISPLAYING LICENSE PLATES

- a. License plates will be attached horizontally to the front and rear of the POV so that both plates are clearly visible. The rear plate will be centered under a light or placed between lights on either side. (Motorcycles and trailers will

display one plate attached horizontally to the rear.) License plates will be attached firmly to the POV using bolts, screws, or brackets. Use of string or wire to secure license plates is prohibited. Two long German license plates are mandatory and will be issued to all U.S. Forces registered POVs (except motorcycles and trailers). These plates will not be bent or altered to fit the POV. If a long plate does not fit the POV, the owner may request one small plate to replace a long plate. Two small plates will be issued only as an exception to policy. The POV owner will have to apply in writing through the RMV for approval of two small license plates.

b. Drilling holes through the face of license plates for attachment is authorized as long as the license plate letters and numbers are not obstructed.

c. POVs will not be operated with license plates obscured by mutilation, dirt, or grime, except for short periods (for example, after a traffic accident or during bad weather).

d. Attaching old license plates or signs to U.S. Forces-provided license plates is not authorized.

e. Owners who operate a POV displaying license plates that are covered (for example, with plastic or glass), canceled, altered, defaced, forged, or not clearly visible and properly secured are subject to—

- (1) Removal of the license plates by commanders, MP, or SF.
- (2) Reregistering the POV according to paragraph 3-7.

If a citation has been issued to a Soldier, and no action is taken to correct the deficiency, then the vehicle's plates will be removed in accordance with AE-190-1, and the Soldier will be required to re-register their vehicle. Soldiers can also be fined by the Polizei for this offense. License plate brackets are available to buy, or order from the AAFES Car Care Center, which can be reached at 0951-32472. Commissaries ring up increased savings for military families.

Commissary customers are ringing in the New Year with record-breaking savings. As a result they should be "resolving" to shop their local commissary more often.

"I'm proud to announce that average customer savings for a family of four have risen to nearly \$3,000 annually," said Defense Commissary Agency Director and CEO Patrick Nixon. "As an agency, we always deliver the message that our savings are an 'average of 30 percent or more' worldwide, but savings have actually been holding steady at about 32 percent for several years now."

DeCA's average savings calculations are based on an annual price comparison study, which compares commissary prices on approximately 30,000 items with those of local supermarkets, major grocery store chains and supercenters. The study also takes into account state taxes and the 5 percent commissary surcharge, which goes to renovate commissaries and build new ones.

Figures for fresh meat and produce, as well as data for locations outside the contiguous United States, are obtained through random sampling. Weighting techniques take into account such factors as cost of living in a variety of areas and regions, as well as customer buying habits.

The commissary benefit also offers an efficient return on investment for the American taxpayer. "The commissary benefit has always been recognized as one of the military's most valued benefits," said Nixon. "When you take customer savings into account, commissaries deliver more than two dollars in benefit to military customers for every tax dollar expended to support the system, and we're extremely proud of that accomplishment."

Die Stern Singer

On Saturday, January 6, Germans celebrate Epiphany, a holiday that recalls the journey of the three wise men (Heilige Drei Könige) to Bethlehem to bring gifts to the infant Jesus. A charming tradition in Germany is that of the Sternsinger (Star Singers). Between January 1 and 6 (Three Kings Day) You may see children mark the day by dressing up as the three kings — Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. The little carolers or "Sternsinger" wear long robes and golden cardboard crowns; one carries a cut-out star suspended from a pole, symbolizing the star that led the wise men to Jesus. They sing carols, sprinkle holy water and spread incense, and as a sign of protection, write in chalk the initials of the wise men and the year above the door of each home they visit. This year the markings will look like this. 20 C+M+B 07. Historically the three letters are supposed to come from the Latin phrase for "Christ bless this house"—"Christus Mansionem Benedicat"

Heilige Drei Könige

January 6, the day of the Three Kings, the last day of Christmas, comes with its own traditions, rituals and symbols. In many homes it is the day the Christmas tree is taken down and considered the end of the "twelve days of Christmas" between Christmas and January 6. In predominantly Catholic areas of Germany, shops may be closed due to the Holiday.



The supernatural force, which fills a person with rage before spreading to its next victim, brings together a group of previously unrelated people who attempt to unlock its secret to save their lives. Texas Chainsaw Massacre: The Beginning (Rated R)

(Jordana Brewster, Taylor Handley)
On one last road trip before they're sent to serve in Vietnam, two friends and their girlfriends get into an accident that calls their local sheriff to the scene. Thus begins a terrifying experience where the teens are taken to a secluded house of horrors, where a young, would-be killer is being nurtured. Rated R (strong horror violence/gore, language, sexual content) 91 min



SAW III - (Rated R)

(Tobin Bell, Shawnee Smith) Jigsaw has disappeared; and with his new apprentice Amanda--the puppet-master behind the cruel, intricate games that have terrified a community and baffled police--he has once again eluded capture and vanished. Dr. Lynn Denlon is unaware that she is about to become the latest pawn on his vicious chessboard. Racing against the ticking clock of Jigsaw's own heartbeat, Lynn and Jeff struggle to make it through each of their vicious tests, unaware that he has a much bigger plan for both of them. (violence, gore, terror, torture, nudity, language) 107 min



Eragon - (Rated PG)

(Edward Speleers, Jeremy Irons) A boy named Eragon finds a polished blue stone in the forest. At first, he thinks it's a lucky discovery, something that will bring meat to his poor family for the winter. Instead, it brings a dragon hatchling, and Eragon is soon thrust into a world of magic and power through which he and the dragon must navigate. Rated PG (fantasy violence, battle sequences, frightening images) 97 min




We are Marshall - (Rated PG)

(Mathew McConaughey, Matthew Fox) A true story, based on devastating events, set in Huntington, West Virginia, about a small town steeped in the rich tradition of college football. For decades, players, coaches, fans and families have come together to cheer on Marshall University's "Thundering Herd". For this team and this community, Marshall football is more than just a sport, it's a way of life. But on a fateful night in 1970, while traveling back to Huntington after a game in North Carolina, 75 members of Marshall's football team and coaching staff were killed in a plane crash. As those left behind struggle to cope with the devastating loss of their loved ones, the grieving families found hope and strength in the leadership of Jack Lengyel, a young coach who was determined to rebuild Marshall's football program and in the process helped to heal a community. 

Flags of Our Fathers - (Rated R)

(Ryan Phillippe, Adam Beach) February 1945. Even as victory in Europe was finally within reach, the war in the Pacific raged on. One of the most crucial and bloodiest battles of the war was the struggle for the island of Iwo Jima, which culminated with what would become one of the most iconic images in history: five Marines and a Navy corpsman raising the American flag on Mount Suribachi. The inspiring photo capturing that moment became a symbol of victory to a nation that had grown weary of war and made instant heroes of the six American soldiers at the base of the flag, some of whom would die soon after, never knowing that they had been immortalized. Rated R (war violence, language) 132 min



Borat - (Rated R)

(Sacha Cohan, Kenneth Davitian) Borat Sagdiyev, Kazakhstan's sixth most famous man and a leading journalist from the State run TV network, travels from his home in Kazakhstan to the U.S. to make a documentary. On his cross-country road-trip, Borat meets real people in real situations with hysterical consequences. Rated R (crude/sexual content, nudity, language) 84 min



A Night at the Museum - (Rated PG)

Good-hearted dreamer Larry Daley (Ben Stiller), despite being perpetually down on his luck, thinks he's destined for something big. But even he could never have imaged how "big," when he accepts what appears to be a menial job as a graveyard-shift security guard at a museum of natural history. During Larry's watch, extraordinary things begin to occur: Mayans, Roman Gladiators, and cowboys emerge from their diorama to wage epic battles; in his quest for fire, a Neanderthal burns down his own display; and a T-Rex reminds everyone why he's history's fiercest predator. Amidst the chaos, the only person Larry can turn to for advice is a wax figure of President Roosevelt (Robin Williams), who helps our hero save the museum.



A Good Year (Rated PG-13)

(Russell Crowe, Albert Finney) London-based investment expert Max Skinner travels to Provence to tend a small vineyard he inherited from his late uncle. When he gets suspended from his job under suspicion of fraud, he settles in to life at the chateau, remembering the time he spent there as a child. Then a determined young California girl arrives claiming to be the illegitimate daughter of the deceased uncle and rightful owner of the vineyard. Rated PG13 (language, sexual content) 118 min



Happy Feet (Rated PG)

(Savion Glover, Elijah Wood) Set deep in Antarctica and into the land of Emperor Penguins, where each needs a heart song to attract a soul mate, a penguin is born who cannot sing.
