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## Issues? Submit them before November deadline

BAMBERG, Germany -- Army Family Action Plan's history speaks for itself; changes to legislation have occurred, policies have been revisited or established and programs or services have improved.

AFAP is the brainchild of Army spouses who wanted to improve the standard of living for their Families.

This grass-roots program has addressed 683 issues in its 28-year history, according to Army OneSource.

The Nov. 9 deadline to submit issues and sign up to volunteer for the upcoming AFAP symposium here is fast approaching.

This year's timeline for the AFAP symposium is condensed into a full working day on Nov. 29 and on Nov. 30 the groups will present their top two issues to Lt. Col. Steven L. Morris, U.S. Army Garrison Bamberg commander.

Since AFAP is a bottom-up program it provides a voice for Soldiers, family members, civilians, retirees and survivors to address local quality of life issues that affect the total Army Family.

"We want to see issues that reflect the bigger picture, not just what the garrison can do today," said Marylou Solorzano, Army Community Service AFAP manager.

"If we do not know what is wrong we cannot fix it," Solorzano said.

Issues can be submitted year-round for AFAP and will be addressed at the garrison-level symposium.

## Brigade troops showcase water handling skills to NATO guests

STUTTGART, Germany -- Soldiers from the 240th Quartermaster Supply Company, 391st Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 16th Sust. Brigade, showcased their knowledge and technical skills to distinguished representatives from 14 countries during a water purification field demonstration at Panzer Kaserne, here, Sept. 30.

The demonstration was part of a three-day NATO-Russia Council Logistics Water Handling Workshop sponsored by the U.S. European Command in order to promote interoperability and build partnership between the U.S. and its allies.

"We're here to demonstrate the U.S. (Army) water capabilities," said Capt.

Brandon Bond, the acting commander for the 240th QMSC. "We're trying to give the other nations a good idea of how we operate."

Another purpose according to Bond, was to share lessons learned and hopefully take away valuable information from the attendees.

Soldiers from the 240th QMSC were there to demonstrate such equipment as the Reverse Osmosis Water Purification Unit, the Lightweight Water Purifier and the semi-trailer mounted fabric tank which is used to transport drinking water.

Spc. Ronnie Biggs, a water purification specialist with the 240th QMSC water platoon and a native of Kennesaw, Ga., helped brief the distinguished visitors on the capabilities of the LWP which can produce enough clean drinking

# Community members reminded to winterize vehicles

BAMBERG, Germany -- Ready for winter? You might not be ready, but you need to get your car ready for the winter season. Here is what you need to know for tire maintenance, a look under the hood, ensuring visibility, preparing a safety kit and driving tips.

## Tire Maintenance

Rain, snow and ice reduce tire traction and compromise control. There are different options you may wish to consider when you purchase your next set of tires:

- High performance winter / snow tires were originally designed to meet strict government regulations for driving on high-speed highways in Europe. They feature large directional and/or asymmetric treads to enhance handling and steering, resist hydroplaning and help tires work through snow and slush.

- All Season tires are a compromise for wintry road conditions and are the minimum legal requirement when operating a vehicle during inclement winter weather.

Check your tire pressure. Fall and early winter are the most critical times to check tire inflation pressures because the days are getting shorter and temperatures are getting colder. For every 10-degree Fahrenheit change in temperature, your tire's inflation will change about one pound per square inch. The inflation goes up with higher temperatures and down with lower. Check your tire pressure in the morning before you drive a few miles. If you park in an attached or heated garage, you will lose pressure when you leave its warmth.

Check your tire treads and sidewalls. Look for thin or uneven tread wear. Take a U.S. penny and insert it Lincoln-head first into your tire tread at the most worn part of the tire. If you see the top of Lincoln's head, you may need new tires. Cut or damaged sidewalls are also weak areas that can collapse under severe conditions. Legal minimum for tire treads in Germany is 1.6 millimeters.

## Under the Hood

Check your battery. It takes a lot more power to start your car when it is cold outside.

Check for clean and tight connections and proper fluid levels. Clean corrosion (a whitish powder) from battery terminals.

Check your cooling system. Your coolant system keeps your car warm. Check the level, acidity and concentration of radiator fluids at least every 3,000 miles. A mixture of 50 percent antifreeze and 50 percent water will protect the engine block from temperatures above -40 degrees Fahrenheit. If you change your radiator fluids yourself, it is a much more pleasant job in the spring or summer than winter and the antifreeze is good for two years.

Clean your fuel system. Add a de-icer to your fuel to keep moisture in the fuel system from freezing.

Change your oil and oil filter. Check your owner's manual for the grade of oil recommended for winter. In most cases, 10w30 oil works year-round.

Inspect and replace. Inspect your air filter, rubber hoses and drive belts; replace as necessary. Also, check your fluid levels including transmission, brake, differential, power steering and window washer fluid.

## Visibility

Safe driving in winter also depends on being able to maintain the best visibility possible. Replace worn blades and ensure both front and rear window defrosters work.

Ensure your washer fluid is "no freeze" and keep extra on hand to fill up the reservoir when empty.

## Winter Safety Kit

Prepare a winter safety kit to keep in your car at all times. Be sure to include:

- Winter necessities such as an ice scraper, tire chains, extra washer fluid, boots and

gloves and abrasive material such as sand, kitty litter or old house shingles for traction in case you get stuck.

- Emergency supplies such as extra clothing and blankets, flashlight with spare batteries, energy bars or dried snacks, drinking water, a battery-powered radio with spare batteries, a first aid kit, booster cables, safety flares, a small shovel, a jug of water and funnel for radiator refills and a reflective vest.

- Tools and "fix-it" supplies such as a screwdriver, pliers, rubber hammer, wrench, a can of penetrating oil and a small throw rug or old shower curtain (for kneeling next to your car or getting under it).

## Winter Driving Tips

No matter how safe your car is, winter driving requires extra attention. Brake gently, accelerate gently and steer gently. Remember these tips, too:

- As every driver's education teacher repeats, steer into a skid. Do not rely on all wheel drive and four-wheel drive.

- If you get stuck in the snow, throw kitty litter, old newspapers or dirt in front of and behind the drive wheels.

- In snowy conditions, drive in lower gears. Avoid using your overdrive feature.

- Always keep your gas tank at least half-full.

- If on temporary duty, be sure to check the rental vehicle for an ice scraper. If the vehicle does not have an ice scraper, be sure to ask the rental car agency for one.

- Plan your travel and route. Check the weather, road conditions and traffic reports. Leave earlier to allow time to get to your destination safely. Let someone know where you are going and your anticipated arrival time.

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# Warner Barracks conducts annual force protection exercise

BAMBERG, Germany -- First responders at Warner Barracks assessed their ability to respond to a crisis with a full-scale protection exercise Friday.

"The annual full force protection exercise tests our response system to ensure we have the resources and personnel to respond to a natural or man-made emergency," said Michael McCullom, Force Protection officer.

The exercise this year was a great success, McCullom said.

Due to the limited emergency services available on Warner Barracks, the cooperation between military and civilian first responders and their host nation counterparts is essential.

"During the exercise this year, the support from host nation first responders, which include the Polizei and Deutsches Rotes Kreuz, was

excellent," McCullom said.

In this year's exercise, a terrorist plot, the scenario included a hostage situation, shootings and explosions.

More than 100 Soldiers, community members and Department of Defense civilians worked alongside nearly 300 host nation responders throughout the exercise to mitigate the scenario threats.

The exercise lasted into the late evening. Several responders stated the training was beneficial for cooperation.

In addition to Department of Defense civilians and Soldiers, there was 35 volunteer role-players and observer controllers comprised of Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets and spouses, McCullom said.

## Troops urged to report animal bites

Officials at the U.S. Army Public Health Command have been working aggressively to prevent additional cases of rabies in Army personnel following the death of a Soldier on Aug. 31. The Soldier contracted the disease while deployed to Afghanistan. This death was the first documented case of rabies in the Department of Defense since 1967.

"The death of this Soldier is very tragic, and we are taking actions to ensure something like this does not happen again," said Lt. Col. Steven Cersovsky, director of epidemiology and disease surveillance at the USAPHC.

"Any Soldier, civilian or contractor who has been deployed to an area of the world where rabies is common could be at risk for developing rabies if exposed to a rabid animal," he emphasized. "It is critical that those with animal exposures, especially bites, receive immediate medical evaluation."

The USAPHC, in partnership with the U.S. Army Medical Command, the DOD, other uniformed services and the National Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, is working to

water to sustain a platoon size element.

"We take (the guests) and break it down piece by piece; where the water flows, how it goes through it, how it moves forward, then we do a live demonstration," Biggs said.

"You can get into a lot of areas that you normally wouldn't be able to with this piece of equipment because of the size of it," he said. "The LWP is a good piece of equipment for small-scale operations."

Pfc. Christopher Holman, a water purification specialist, with the 240th QMSC water platoon and a native of Dearborn Heights, Mich., briefed the distinguished visitors on the intricate workings of the 3,000 gallon per-hour ROWPU which is capable of producing up to 60,000 gallons of potable water per day. The ROWPU is comprised of a large number of complex parts, explained Holman which, if inoperable, can cease the production of much-needed drinking water and compromise the mission. The operator must be proficient in his trade.

Holman, who has been working with the equipment less than a year, attributes his well-honed skills to those he works with.

"(My platoon sergeant) puts a lot of faith in me to run this," said Holman. "He trusts me to know what I'm doing. It's great leadership and great peers within our platoon. We're always there to help each other."

A big advantage to these types of events, explained Bond, is the opportunity to train, maintain skills and to make sure the equipment is in working order.

"Our water platoon likes to go out and exercise

the equipment and become more proficient," Bond said. "How well this has gone is proof that these guys have been doing that. It definitely reaffirms that we've been doing things properly. Anytime we can get out and run our equipment it's a great training opportunity."

"You have to consider all the tsunamis and earthquakes and everything that's been happening in the world," added Biggs. "We have to be very proficient and know what we're doing because we could be called upon at any given time so it's really good that we get a chance to train up and use our equipment."

Another benefit of the demonstration, said Bond, was to give the Soldiers some well-deserved exposure. A few of the Soldiers

even received coins of excellence from visiting general officers.

"I think it's a great opportunity for these Soldiers," Bond said. "The Soldiers typically aren't exposed to people echelons above them. That's just something that these guys don't normally get to do."

Biggs said he doesn't do it for awards or notoriety but he enjoys what he does and chose his specialty as a way of helping others.

"It was something that was interesting. I really think that if you're going to be in the military, try to pick something that you can contribute to and give back," Biggs said. "We support a lot of humanitarian efforts."





expeditiously identify, evaluate and treat any service members, DOD civilians, retirees and contractors who may have been exposed to rabies while deployed. Individuals who meet the following criteria are advised to report for a medical evaluation as soon as possible:

- Those who had a possible animal exposure that occurred after March 1, 2010. A possible animal exposure is a bite or contact with the saliva of warm-blooded animals such as dogs, cats, bats, foxes, skunks, raccoons and jackals.
- Those who had no medical evaluation or incomplete/undocumented evaluation or an incomplete series of rabies shots following an exposure incident. Individuals who are not 100 percent confident they received appropriate and completely documented care should be evaluated.

Although rabies is a fatal disease, it is preventable. It is also very rare in the United States, due to an active vaccination program for pets. The vast majority of rabies cases in the United States each year occur in wild animals like raccoons, skunks, bats and foxes.

cases are the result of bites from rabid dogs.

“The rabies virus infects the central nervous system, ultimately causing disease in the brain and death,” Cersovsky said.

But death from rabies is not inevitable if a person receives proper medical care promptly after being bitten by a wild or stray animal.

“If medical treatment is obtained promptly following a rabies exposure, nearly all cases of rabies will be prevented,” Cersovsky said. “But the best way to prevent rabies is to avoid contact with stray and wild animals.”

Soldiers who deploy are educated about how to prevent the disease during routine pre-deployment medical threat briefings.
